IV. WEST COAST REGIONAL OFFICE OF NATIONAL MARINE SANCTUARIES UPDATE

William Douros, Director of West Coast Regional National Marine Sanctuaries, shared his report. Adjusting to COVID has resulted in fast fluctuations between remote and on-site working. The Center for Disease Control guides the actions of the Sanctuary's workers. Currently, the COVID community level in Monterey is high. In SF, it is low. In Santa Cruz it is medium. The visitor centers are functioning, vessel and field operations are close to normal because they can be done outdoors, and SAC meetings and other public facing operations are being phased back in.

Various upcoming events were discussed. This year marks the 30th Anniversary of MBNMS and the 50th Anniversary of national marine sanctuaries. A Gala celebrating the milestone will be hosted by the MBNMS Foundation and held on September 17, 2022. There will possibly be another event to mark the achievement in Monterey in October. An additional MBNMS Anniversary Event will be held at the Sanctuary Exploration Center. New logos for MBNMS, a feature on a Netflix series, and a stamp series have been made to celebrate the anniversary.

The National Academy of Public Administration conducted a review of the sanctuary system and provided recommendations on how it can be strengthened. The report is available [here](#). Director Douros also went over the budget picture. Big increases for National Marine Sanctuaries have been proposed by the president in recent years to help sanctuary management. However, less is allocated per acre to marine sanctuaries than to terrestrial protected areas. Funds are first appropriated to the National Marine Sanctuary system, and then budgeted out to individual sites. Currently, the President's operations budget request is \$61 million for 2022 and \$86.7 million for 2023. The President's construction budget request is \$5 million for 2022 and \$4 million for 2023. The current status of markups from the Senate Appropriation Committee is \$70 million for operations and \$7 million for construction. The current status of markups from the House Appropriations Committee is \$68 million for operations and \$10 million for construction.

Director Douros described multilateral priorities of the sanctuary system. The first priority is whale conservation, which consists of reducing strikes through voluntary speed reductions and future regulations. Channel Islands National Marine Sanctuary is currently using incentives to reduce strikes. The second priority is conserving benthic habitats and deep sea corals. This goal

consists of providing education and outreach that focuses on the importance of deep sea habitats and its threats. The third priority is climate change adaptation. The sanctuary system is expanding this work, with Greater Farallones National Marine Sanctuary as the lead. The work focuses on the adaptations that local governments can take to mitigate climate change. The fourth priority is promoting the Blue Economy, which involves labeling or certification opportunities to reward businesses.

The bilateral priorities were also described. The first is kelp forest restoration with GFNMS as the lead and MBNMS as the partner organization. The second is sub adult white shark monitoring with CINMS as the lead and MBNMS as the partner organization. The third is preventing vessel groundings with MBNMS as the lead and GFNMS as the partner organization. The fourth is collaborating with National Marine Fisheries Service on a big watershed project with the West Coast Regional Office as the lead and MBNMS as the partner organization.

Ongoing priorities for the sanctuary system include improved enforcement efforts and facilities planning. New sanctuary designations have been added to the inventory. The new Alaÿuum Kanuux (Heart of the Ocean) proposed designation has been accepted by NOAA. Others are still in the inventory. The Chumash Heritage National Marine Sanctuary designation process has begun, and NOAA is striving for a release of draft materials by the end of 2022. A total of 27,000 comments were included in the nomination, with the vast majority of comments in favor of the sanctuary. Many issues are to be addressed before designation, including offshore energy, military operation, collaborations with many indigenous communities, and various boundary options.

Gary Hoffman asked how the Damage Assessment, Remediation, and Restoration Fund (DARRF) program is funded. Director Douros responded that a normal budget will approve the use of that fund. It is often used for vessels that run aground in order to help prevent oil spills. DARRF is a separate pot of money that MBNMS has access to for vessel removal and response. It is a finite amount of money that gets restored by congress or by national initiative.

PJ Webb commented that the Coastal Discovery system is doing well, with high visitor numbers.

V. INFORMATION ITEM – DIVERSIFICATION OF SAC

The Diversity and Inclusion Subcommittee shared their goals for the upcoming recruitment season. It plans to update the SAC website and application, including a diversity statement for the website and an application question on how the applicant plans to engage diverse and underrepresented communities.

The Subcommittee also determined its outreach strategies for the upcoming SAC member recruitment season, including outlining the benefits of being on the SAC, having MBNMS staff advertise at community events and facilitate partnerships with schools and committees (Ocean Guardian School, broadcast council meeting to schools, etc), hosting “Get to Know You” sessions for interested applicants, providing Spanish language options in various media outlets, expanding travel funds to primaries and alternates, continuing with hybrid in person/remote meetings, and creating a “Buddy Club” for former members to mentor new ones.

The Subcommittee also described its programmatic recommendations, including stipends for qualified new members, childcare at meetings, resuming member updates, and creating a working group for Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, Justice, and Belonging (DEIJB).

After the Subcommittee shared, there was concern that comments from the rest of the SAC were not included in recommendations from the Subcommittee. Members said that it would have been helpful for the rest of the SAC members to see what was submitted as recommendations and given the opportunity to offer amendments (such as expanding the definition of diversity, etc.). Dan Haifley made a motion to withdraw the motion to approve the Subcommittee's recommendations. Mike Bekker seconded the motion. The Action Item then became an Information Action. Members were asked to get their comments to Haven.Parker@noaa.gov in the next two weeks to be distributed with the recommendations. The Subcommittee will then meet and get revisions back to the SAC. Then any comments will go to the entire SAC during the next meeting.

VII. INFORMATION ITEM: VESSEL INCIDENT COMMITTEE UPDATE

Gary Hoffman shared that the Subcommittee has been working with GFNMS to present on vessel incidents in GFNMS and explain the responsibilities in different jurisdictions. GFNMS is in the process of making a condition report and a management report update that will have a focus on the definition of deserted vessels.

The Subcommittee has been conversing about issues of boat insurance. It has discussed the possibilities of a sanctuary asset forfeiture fund, which would consist of registering boats in CA as fund source to pay for incidents when they occur. The Subcommittee has also discussed commercial boat inspections to prevent future vessel incidents, as well as working with John Laird to address funding issues for insurance requirements.
